



In November I bought a wicker wreath on impulse, in a Charity shop in Bourne. When I got home, I found an email from Denman At Home with the latest list of courses. Lo and behold, there was one on fabric wreath making, so I signed up immediately! My daughter, not a WI member, had recently inherited her grandfather's sewing machine, so was keen to use it, and signed up for the same course.

Claire Salmon's course was very helpful, with lots of useful tips and ideas. The instruction sheet and templates were sent out in advance, so I did some of the preparation beforehand. I did a lot of the hand stitching as

she talked, as I had opted to do simple felt hearts and outline them with blanket stitch. My daughter used her sewing machine to stitch the heart shapes. The Zoom class only lasted for an hour in the afternoon, but by the end of the day I had completed the project – though I used PVA glue to attach the shapes and it wasn't fully dry until the next day. I am very proud of the end result.

For a £5 class it was excellent value, and I can highly recommend giving a class a try. There is something for everyone so really worth having a look!

Big Garden Birdwatch – What will you see?

Between 29th and 31st January 2021, the world's largest garden wildlife survey returns with close to half-a-million people taking part every year. We hope many of you can spare a little bit of time to get involved! In 2020, we've certainly seen how important the natural world is to our mental health and wellbeing. Taking an hour out to watch and record the birds in your garden, green space or courtyard, from the safety of your own home, can bring joy and comfort during these unsettling times.

Not only that, but the results that are submitted to the RSPB will **help to build an annual snapshot of how our birdlife is doing across the UK**. Did you know that, since the Birdwatch began in 1979, 144



million birds have been counted and the number of starlings and robins has declined by 80% and 46% respectively; these are both garden favourites that we would surely miss if they weren't around? We know that nature is in crisis and it is only by our understanding of how our wildlife is faring that we can protect it.

All you need to do to take part is **sign up online** at <u>www.rspb.org.uk/birdwatch</u> for a **free Big Garden Birdwatch guide**. This includes a bird identification chart, top tips for your birdwatch, RSPB shop voucher (redeemable in shops and online), plus advice on how to help you attract wildlife to your garden. Shelagh's Bird News



How well do you know your Owls? Do any really call Too-wit Too-woo?

Here in the Lincolnshire Fens and westwards to the A1, we are lucky. A particularly good area for all species is the Deeping High Bank alongside the River Welland between Deeping, Crowland and Spalding, including the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust Nature Reserve at Deeping Lakes. However, many other locations with waterways, rough damp ground, pastures, woods and barns can be just as productive. Nature reserves such as Frampton Marsh and Baston fen are particularly worthwhile. Dunsby fen is another 'hotspot'.

Some species are surprisingly active in daylight.

Little Owls are often seen perched on the trunks of old willow trees and sometimes also on the


roofs of barns at dusk. Little Owls were introduced to Britain by Lord Lilford in the 19th century close to Oundle and are now widespread throughout England.

Tawny Owls are arguably the noisiest and commonest owl but also the most nocturnal making them very hard to see. The myth of the '*Too-wit Too-woo*' calls dates back to the time of Shakespeare but is actually two birds calling each other. The female calls 'Kewick' answered by the male 'Ooo-ooo'.

The Barn Owl is probably the one that is most often seen hunting low over fields and ditches nearly always looking a ghostly shade of white. In winter they are most active from mid afternoon but when breeding if they have hungry youngsters to feed they will sometimes hunt throughout the day. They are renowned for loud hissing and screeching noises in the dead of night. They nest in boxes and barns and are common in this area. Pole mounted nest boxes are a frequent sight in fenland habitats.

Long-eared Owls are an uncommon breeder and also a winter visitor from mainland Europe, but a good spot to see them from late autumn onwards is the island in the largest pit at Deeping Lakes. Sometimes they roost in the open for many weeks. They do not, however, have long ears! These are just tufts of feathers above their eyes.

Finally the **Short-eared Owl** is also a winter visitor, often in good numbers, and likes rough pastures, wetlands and fields with lots of fence posts to perch on. They can sometimes be seen perched all day even by the roadside but are most active from mid afternoon. In Spring they return mostly to Scandinavia but occasionally a pair will stop to breed. I took the photograph below on a cold and wet day last month by the River Welland.

Amazing Journeys that Save Lives – in support of the 'Make a Match" campaign

Lincolnshire South Federation's Public Affairs Sub-Committee hosted an online talk by Elizabeth Jenks, who is a volunteer courier for the blood cancer charity Anthony Nolan (AN). Online meetings have their benefits and consequently we were especially delighted to welcome ladies from Barnstaple in Devon, Bicester in Oxfordshire, the Isle of Wight and neighbouring Lincolnshire North as well as our own local members.

Elizabeth briefly explained how AN came into being and the work it does. AN is unique in (normally*) using only volunteers as their couriers. When Elizabeth first signed up in March 2003, she was one of only 10 couriers. Now there are more than 60 who, in 2019, made more than 1,300 trips to collect stem cell or bone marrow donations from all over the world. One



stark fact that emerged was that someone is diagnosed with blood disease every 14 minutes!

Stem cell transplant is the last step in treating blood diseases such as leukaemia. Should all other treatment fail, family members will be the first port of call for stem cell/bone marrow donation. However, only c 30% get a related match, in which case the consultant will contact AN, or one of the other organisations in the field (see below), who will input the patient's details into the worldwide register to try and find a match. All organisations have access to this register, no matter where or through which organisation donors have registered. If a potential donor is highlighted, further details will be sought to try and achieve the best match possible. The donor will undergo a medical and if all is well, will donate, in 90% of cases via blood, and 10% of cases via bone marrow. A courier is then sent to wherever in the world that donor may be, to collect the precious stem cell/bone marrow. There is a time limit involved, just 72 hours from collection to use. This can mean some quite hair-raising travel experiences – imagine coping with traffic jams, cancelled or postponed flights, bureaucratic hitches, security alerts, to name just a few potential snags!

As might be imagined, COVID-19 has had an enormous impact on the transportation of donated blood/bone marrow. Now couriers can only travel within the UK, so collect the tissue from an airport and then take it to whichever hospital requires it. Social distancing means most use their own vehicles rather than public transport and family members have been co-opted as companions to share driving on the sometimes long journeys from home, to airport, to hospital and back. Also, with almost no fundraising events possible, financial resources have suffered badly and, like all charities, AN is desperately in need of donations (visit <u>www.anthonynolan.org</u> to find out how to do this).

There is also an ongoing shortage of registered donors. Young males are most sought after, as men produce a higher number of stem cells, but females are also gratefully accepted and indeed make up the majority registered. AN will accept registrations from those aged 16-30, although starting ages vary with organisation. You are not eligible to register if you are over 30, but if registered before your 31st birthday, will remain on the register until you reach 61. Black and ethnic minorities are under-represented, as the world's largest donor registers are in countries with predominantly white Northern European populations. Recent analysis has shown that patients from a minority ethnic background now have a 37% chance of finding the optimal match from an unrelated donor. This has increased from 20% in 2013 but is still well below the 71% chance for a white patient.

The work done by these volunteer couriers is truly life-saving. They are most certainly unsung heroes in our community and all who listened to Elizabeth were both amazed and impressed by her talk. Thanks to all who attended for their interest and we encourage everyone to spread the word to increase the number of stem cell/bone marrow donors.

Can you help??

Looking for Wrens 1946-1981

We've received this request for help to track down ex WRENs who served aboard HMS Dauntless. Please pass this on:

Thanks to Covid I was working from home during the first Lockdown but there were gaps in my day where I was 'at a loose end'. As I am an ex Wren, it occurred to me that now would be the time to undertake a project that I'd wanted to do for a long time – to gather all the 'class photos' (known in the Royal Navy as Division photos) from the training school at HMS Dauntless, Reading and have a researchable database open to ex Wrens. Over the years I had become aware that of the



30,000+ ladies who had gone through the gates of HMS Dauntless between 1946-1981, a large proportion had 'lost' their photos from that period. For some this was due to household catastrophes – flood, fire etc, but the most heart-breaking were those that were deliberately destroyed when marriages broke up or left behind when families moved home.

I discovered that Wrens who joined post 1981 and who went through HMS Raleigh had an archive of class photos but there was nothing set up for HMS Dauntless I know that all these photos are archived officially but the effort to track them down and then obtain a copy is way beyond the means or timeframe for most ladies. I wanted something that was supplied by Wrens for use by Wrens.

Within a day of starting to gather the photos I realized that this was much bigger than I had first anticipated. Not in terms of the possible number of photos (approximately 1300) but that there were wider implications for the use of all this research.

I was hit with a deluge of responses, so much so another Wren friend in London volunteered to help sort, tease out dates and data and hunt out contact sources for veteran Wrens. Initially via social media we asked ladies to supply their Division photos with any other training photos they may have along with their memories, names of people they joined with and so on.

Within a month we had over 1000 ladies registered. Within two months over 20,000 social interactions registered on the web page. On-line conversations flourished as people found their old photographs. Old friends had been found, new friends made, ladies were forming support groups when they discovered they lived near each other. Ladies isolated due to Covid now had friends to talk to and something to look forward to as each day, more photos and more memories became available online. Photos were being used to help elderly ladies with memory issues or all those now in care to give them an opportunity to wander down memory lane to the 'best days of our life!' Social media is amazing, and we have ladies, now living all over the world, logging in to see what's new on the daily upload.

However many ladies prefer not to use social media so we have had articles printed in all the major Naval publications, over 300 regional newspapers,40 ladies' magazines and via Royal British Legion and Veteran's groups. We've also been interviewed a couple of times for Canadian radio about the project.

But we are very aware of Anno Domini - there are ladies out there with tales to tell, photos to share and memories to rekindle and we desperately want to get in touch with them.

We are hopeful to reach as many ex Dauntless Wrens as possible. We are doing well so far in that we have over 660 photos live online but there's another 650 left to find and it's these ladies we are looking for.
