### CLIMATE AMBASSADORS

#### Food Waste

Are you switched on when it comes to fighting food waste? Christmas time can be terrible for food waste – whether that's down to overbuying, panic shopping or simply throwing away edible food. We were shocked to discover that throwing away just a single portion of Christmas dinner produces the same carbon emissions as having your Christmas lights on every day in December. That's a set of 500 fairy lights, on for a grand total of 155 hours!

Did you know that serving a meal buffet style results in less waste? This encourages people to take what they know they'll eat and avoids plate waste. Everything that's left is then in perfect condition to be boxed up and used as leftovers!

Your food is at its best when it's on your plate, ready to be enjoyed. It's perfect in your fridge, ready to be used, or stored in the freezer for another time. It's at its worst when it's in your bin.

Saving food means saving money, but look at the bigger picture, too. Reducing food waste is good for the planet, as it helps slow down global warming. If global food waste were a country, it would be third largest emitter of greenhouse gases after China and the US. By using up every edible bit of your food, you're doing your bit to look after the environment; imagine what we could achieve if we all make a change!

#### Christmas Trees

How do you recycle your used Christmas tree? St Barnabas Hospice will collect your tree for a donation (suggested £15) from your home. The tree is chipped by arborists to make fuel for Biomass boilers. Details can be found <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a>. Alternatively you can cut it up and put in your garden waste bin.

#### Wrapping Paper

Can Christmas wrapping paper be recycled?

Before you go ahead and throw all the torn-off paper straight in a big bin bag, it's worth knowing there's a quick trick to tell if wrapping paper can be recycled.

It's called the scrunch test. The good news is that it's super easy.

All you have to do is get a bit of the wrapping paper in question and crumple it into a ball. Now open your hand and see if the paper stays scrunched together or bounces back open. If the paper stays in its ball, it can likely be recycled. If it bounces back open, it can't be recycled.



### "Let me show you what a woman can do!"

We were delighted to be informed that one of our members. Jenny Cawthorne of Wellingore WI, was awarded Highly Commended in the Lady Denman Cup 2022.

Jenny's entry is here for you to enjoy:



I contemplate this as I frustratedly peg out washing ........ Worst thing that has happened to ME today?

Someone, left a tissue in his pyjama pocket! I'm fortunate, others not so ......

Artemesia furiously swept the brush across the gesso surface, anger infecting every stroke, pure venom in her desire to avenge defilement and injustice suffered by others of her sex. Hence previous subjects: 'Judith Beheading Holofernes 'and similarly grotesque subjects of horrifying realism. However, more subtle current painting could still add resonance to her continued fight against male dominance and oppression. She stood proud in a man's world; a rarity in 1615. Angry tears spilled, as she painted, not of self-pity; more powerful emotions. Her own face as 'St. Catherine' emerged from the canvas, challenging the voyeur. Men could destroy 'Catherine' for her faith in this world, but NOT the next. Catherine is calm, dignified, and all seeing; her devout faith for which she was being executed, giving courage. Artemesia calmed as she painted, knowing that with each creation..... through a holistic appreciation of human nature, realism, physicality; simultaneously conveying sexual and spiritual mood, revelation, and a painterly use of chiaroscuro, she could give a

'Morning!' Todays subject; 'Artemesia Gentleschi [ 1593-1653].....

Let me show you what a woman DID through wielding a paintbrush, against oppression ......

'How do you spell Arte..... Miss? '

message.....

'Look at your notes...... A precociously gifted artist, formidable personality, lived a life of independence [rare for women in 1600's]. The dark subjects she often portrayed, full of eroticism, sexual physicality, brutality, were influenced by appalling circumstances. Aged 19, she was raped by her father's friend Agostini Tassi. During questioning, she was tortured. Tassi, was later acquitted.

See examples of violent, blood thirsty subjects? Yet she is capable of a gentler, but strong composition, as seen in her painting of St. Catherine about to be tortured on a spiked wheel for her Christianity.

What 'ism' can you think of has influenced her technique?'

'Yes Lisa?'

'Carravaggism, Miss'.

'Thank you, yes! Explain?'

'Chiarascuro Extremes of dark & light to dramatic effect'
'Thank you Toni'
'Now, revenge was it in fact sweet for Artemesia ? not necessarily'
Michelle screwed her eyes up, to prevent tears spilling onto her History Of Art notes, she jabbed at the paper with her biro as she scribbled rape, injustice. The pressure of her pen indenting the lined paper, she, feeling the graze from the brick wall through the cotton of her school shirt. The blood and dirt hastily hidden under the navy cardigan. She gazed at the craft knife on her desk until it doubled. What she would like to do to Him. How dare he defile, assault her! Yet a man can do this to woman. A woman cannot do this to a man! She shook, gritted her teeth, humiliated, ravaged and distraught for her loss
Her assailant, so confident, so full of himself, swaggered off able to do exactly what he wanted, when and where he wanted, no scars on him!
